Every year, Kiwanis International holds a leadership conference, called Key Leader, for students who show leadership promise. Often these students are Key Club members, and most of those students hold leadership positions in their clubs. There is approximately one conference for each state, though occasionally states mix. About thirty New York and Connecticut students attended this year's conference at Camp Warwick in Warwick, New York.

I was one of those lucky students. Two others attended from the Calhoun Key Club, Greg Mills and Constance Reilly. Key Leader lasted for two nights and three days, beginning on October 6th and ending on October 8th. The program is designed to benefit students who hope to become better leaders and acquire or move up in leadership positions. The program was largely organized by Kim Scharoff, the current president of Merrick Kiwanis. Activities included group work, team-building skills, and group discussions regarding leadership. The conference, as well as the people I met there, left a distinct impression on me.

A large part of the conference focused on discussion and interaction between students. We had many group discussions, group work, and group presentations. Most times the groups were changed, so everyone got a chance to meet and work with many other students. Some activities were humorous, others serious; one such 'serious' activity was discussing the morality of questionable situations. An example is music sharing

via programs such as Kazaa or LimeWire. While the situation is not a capital offense, the discussion that followed was intense. You don't get to experience that every day, honest conversations between a collection of mostly intelligent and strong-willed people. It was unforgettable.

Perhaps the best part of the weekend was meeting so many new people. The opportunity to meet a group of thirty people who all had leadership ambitions was incredible. These are the people who will be CEOs, politicians, professors, or perhaps the president of their home club. Regardless of how large their ambitions, these people will make something of themselves. The opportunity to meet and befriend these people was invaluable. Naturally there were many strong personalities, but everyone was unbelievably friendly to each other. For the sponsoring Kiwanis clubs it's time to contact their sponsored clubs: Circle K Clubs, Key Clubs, Builders Clubs, K-Kids Clubs and Aktion Clubs. In order to ensure a successful year of growth and service, kindly review the following recommendations and follow up as soon as possible:

Make sure that club meetings have resumed following the summer recess and a Kiwanis Advisor appointed to assist them. Encourage the Kiwanis Advisor to report on a weekly or monthly basis the status of the club to the Board of Directors or club President.

Train the club officers if they haven't attended the Division, or Regional Training Sessions for officers.

Assist in the implementation of a membership drive to replace students who have graduated and to augment additional manpower needed for service projects and other club activities.

Participate in the preparation of a budget necessary to support all activities of the club.

Support them financially and provide transportation when needed to the Divisionals, Regional Training Conferences, Convention and other activities.

Invite the Faculty Advisor, Club Members, and the School principal to a regular Kiwanis club meeting and encourage Kiwanians to attend their club meetings.

REMEMBER – Communicate – work together as the K-Family – the avenue to success.
