Does your club have internal publicity? Do you have a newsletter or any kind of communication for your members? If you don't have this type of communication for your club, you should. Keeping members informed contributes to more member involvement and satisfaction.

An organization such as Kiwanis, which serves the community, is much more effective in its service when the members are aware of what is happening at club meetings, throughout the division and the district. Our meetings should be fun and informative and not just an endless list of activities and announcements; the newsletter is the internal arm and connection that helps to keep the meetings from becoming stale.

With a club newsletter, each member receives the same information and has a printed record/reminder, calendar of events, and the report of club board actions and plans. These newsletters are archived (or should be) as part of the club's records. What fun to look back to older issues when celebrating significant anniversaries for the club.

How often should we publish? Ideally every time there is a meeting but that does, get expensive. Once a month is better than not at all. Some clubs do bi-weekly newsletters and send postcards in the interim. Whatever fits your time and budget as long as your membership is kept informed. Newsletters distributed at a meeting usually are left behind and not read. They should be mailed either by "snail mail" or email. Sending by email can save the club a lot of money. The newsletter could be in Microsoft Word or converted to a .pdf file in Adobe Acrobat, such as the district uses to send information to clubs.

Some clubs have jackets on their newsletters with paid ads which pay for the postage and paper and printing (or at least partially) for each issue. This, of course, is time consuming and requires someone to solicit the ads and place them in the issue.


Many modes of presentation can be used. Some clubs have glossy, typeset newsletters and others use a memo-style of communication. Most are produced from typed copy and black and white "line" (not shaded) artwork is used. It's nice to have someone who can work with graphics, but that is not necessary. Photos of activities and members can be included; some are printing their newsletters on color printers even though it takes a while to print 20 or 30 newsletters.

What should be in the newsletter?

- 1. Announcements of club meetings and activities
- 2. Synopsis report of the previous meeting(s) 3. Committee reports, recognition of individ-
- ual and club contributions and accomplishments
