Patchogue Donates \$30,000 for Pediatric Nursing Education at Brookhaven Memorial

The Kiwanis Club of **PATCHOGUE**, Suffolk East Division – has a long history of identifying challenges facing children in the community. Recently, Brookhaven Memorial Hospital built a new state of the art Emergency Department. The facility is tremendous and even has a designated room for pediatric care and a special children's waiting area.

The club identified a need for the staff to be trained in the special care needed for pediatric patients that come into the Emergency Department. To meet these needs the Hospital is able to launch its new Kiwanis Pediatric Education Program. This program already has scheduled for 2005 includes the following educational programs:

• Pediatric Advanced Life Support (PALS) •

Emergency Nursing Pediatric Course (ENPC)
• Trauma Nursing Core Curriculum (TNCC) • STABLE (a pediatric assessment program for RN's) • Triage Curriculum (a 16 hour course to assure proper triage of patients).

In addition to offering this coursework, Brookhaven Memorial Hospital will host a lecture series dedicated to personnel working in the Emergency Department and specific to the care of the pediatric patient. Brookhaven clinicians working in the

Nursing Department, in such areas as Pediatrics and the SICU, and Physician Assistants will have an opportunity to participate in these programs as well.

To make this a reality, the Kiwanis Club of Patchogue recently donated \$30,000 to cover the costs associated with this curricu-

lum. In recognition of their donation, BMHMC is naming the Pediatric Care Room in the Emergency Department in honor of the club. In just the past 15 years, the Kiwanis Club of Patchogue has donated over \$140,000 to Brookhaven Memorial Hospital Medical Center for pediatric care.
