NEW YORK DISTRICT TRUSTEE CANDIDATE DEJULIO PRESENTS CONCERT KEYNOTE

Tom DeJulio, Past Governor and candidate for the office of Kiwanis International Trustee, delivered the keynote address May 6 at Long Island's Tilles Center for the Performing Arts where the New York District and the Kiwanis Pediatric Trauma Center Foundation celebrated the 90th Anniversary Celebration of Kiwanis International.

Past Governor Tom explained how the vision of the Kiwanis founders was brought to life by generations of Kiwanians executing service projects over nine decades. Inspired by the musical venue of the Tilles Center, he quoted the lyrics of Stephen Sondheim's composition, "Putting it Together," and reminded the audience that "a vision is only a vision if it is only in one's head".

We are indebted to hundreds of thousands of Kiwanians who recognized the fact that having only a vision is no solution to the world's problems. As the song goes, "everything depends on execution - bit by bit, piece by piece, Kiwanians have put it all together by their selfless deeds of service to others for ninety years." Tom added that the vision that is embodied in the first Object of Kiwanis became the indelible "work of art" which has impacted the lives of children in countless ways and has given Kiwanis its distinctive identity.

Past Governor Tom generated some laughs from the audience when he stated there is nothing that upsets a Kiwanian more than someone who answers the question "What is Kiwanis?" with a comparison to Lions or Rotary, celebrating its 100th anniversary this year. Tom said,

"With all due respect to our elders in the service world, Kiwanis has carved out its own identity through its diversity and its incomparable involvement with sponsored youth programs."

He called the Kiwanis vision "a vision of the future for our children," and congratulated those who sponsored and attended this fundraiser for ensuring safer, healthier, and happier futures for children served by the Kiwanis Pediatric Trauma Center.

The gala celebration was attended by well over 200 persons and raised \$30,000 to benefit children served by the KPTC at North Shore/LIJ's Schneider Children's Hospital.

Those in attendance were treating to an outstanding concert performance featuring the Diocese of Rockville Centre Choir and the Island Chamber Symphony. The audience delighted hearing the eclectic program of beautiful music which included Charles Gounod's Mass of St. Cecelia, selections from "The King and I," a medley of Duke Ellington favorites, and the Battle Hymn of the Republic. The finale, a special arrangement of Irving Berlin's God Bless America received sustained applause and a standing ovation.

Past International President and the KPTC's founding President, Tony Kaiser, organized the event and served as *Continued on Page 5*

Also we should show the rest of the Kiwanis world our interest in International affairs. There are many issues to be brought up at the Convention and as delegates for your club you will have an opportunity to voice and vote. One important issue is that of electing our own candidate, PG Tom DeJulio, International Trustee.

Club Secretaries should be sure to send in the forms to Kiwanis International and to our District Office notifying them (and us) who will be representing your club at the convention. Also remember that your club must have their club dues up to date in order to be able to vote. Lt Governors & Lt. Governors-Elect (LTGs 05-06) are delegates at large but can represent your club if so designated on the delegate forms.

Delegate forms go to those who register for the Convention and must be signed by the Club President and Secretary before processing copies to KI and the NY District offices.

CLUB ELECTIONS & LTG/LTG-ELECT ELECTIONS

By now, all clubs should have conducted their club elections for 2005-06 and should process the appropriate copies to KI and NY District no later than June 1st.

Divisions should have conducted their elections for 2005-06 Lt. Governor and Lt. Governor-Elect. Forms on both positions should already have been completed and mailed or faxed to the District Office. NY District By-Laws require that to be Lt.

Connelly's Heroism Memorialized - 2005 Recipients Awarded

The first Robert P. Connelly Medal of Heroism was awarded posthumously to Robert P. Connelly at the 52nd Annual Kiwanis International Convention in Houston, Texas (1967) with this statement—"By his unselfish action he put tremendous and dramatic meaning into the phrase 'personal involvement,' which is so much a part of Kiwanis philosophy. This man was the epitome of all that Kiwanis strives to be."

The Kiwanis International Board of Trustees established the Robert P. Connelly Medal "for service beyond the call of duty."

Recipients receive a bronze medal displaying Robert P. Connelly's likeness, mounted on a walnut board with the inscription "for service beyond the call of duty." The recipient's name is engraved on a medal plate. Connelly recipients may receive a financial award along with the medal.

The medal is to honor those who risk death or physical harm when "they might just as well have passed along the way." There are more than 500 Robert P. Connelly Medal recipients. A complete list of medal recipients is maintained at the Kiwanis International Foundation office in Indianapolis, Indiana.

The following individuals were recognized for their heroic acts by the Kiwanis International Foundation Board of Trustees in February 2005.

Michael Bennett and John Sawchuck, who subdued an armed student after he already shot at two other students, barely missing them. The 16-year-old student shot Bennett, a special education teacher at the school, in the leg. Sawchuck, the assistant principal, then stopped the student and held him until police arrived. They were nominated by the **Kiwanis Club of Sand Lake**, New York.

Paul Kostner, who rescued a man who was drowning in rough surf created by Hurricane Frances. The 17-year-old Kostner dove in and swam 500 feet through turbulent water to save the man. "You just have to dive to the bottom until they let go," Cutter said at the time. Both made it to shore safely. The **Kiwanis Club of Southampton Town**, New York, nominated Kostner.



The Integrated Domestic Violence (IDV) Courts respond to an historic problem in the court system, which requires domestic violence victims and their families to appear in different courts before multiple judges, often located in different parts of a county, to address their legal issues. Dedicated to the "one family - one judge" model, IDV Courts allow a single judge to hear multiple case types - criminal, family and matrimonial which relate to one family where the underlying issue is domestic violence. IDV Courts aim to provide more informed judicial decision-making and greater consistency in court orders, while reducing the number of court appearances. In addition, these courts offer enhanced services to victims and ensure offender accountability.

Judge Elma shared her experiences presiding over the Monroe County IDV Court and related how this court is really helping families deal with many destructive issues. The judge claims that she has seen a success rate of over 90%.


This is the Official Call to the Officers, Directors and Members that the 88th Annual Convention of the New York District Kiwanis International Inc. will be held at the Binghamton Regency, Binghamton, New York from Thursday, August 18th through Sunday, August 21st 2005.

The business to be transacted will include the completion and reporting of all 2004-2005 Administrative Year business and all such new business as is needed for the operation of the New York District for the 2005-2006 Administrative Year. Included will be the election of District Officers, installation of the Board of Directors and any other business that may properly come before the delegate body. The House of Delegates will be convened on Saturday, August 20th, 2005 at 1:00 p.m.

Article X Section 6 of the New York District Bylaws states that each chartered club in good standing is entitled, in any District Convention, to three (3) Delegates. The club shall designate one (1) Alternate for each Delegate to the convention.

The form for properly certifying Club Delegates and Alternates will be mailed to each club and must be filed with the District Secretary at the New York District Kiwanis Office no later than July 20th, 2005, thirty (30) days prior to the Convention.






Palmyra Macedon Kiwanians Dresses Up for Read Across America Program

Canandaigua Hops on Board to Keep Community Children Safe

The Kiwanis Club of **CANANDAIGUA**, Finger Lakes Division – In mid-February, the Young Children Priority One (YCPO) committee of the Canandaigua, New York Kiwanis Club met to brainstorm ideas for a child safety project. A few great ideas surfaced and a second meeting was planned to discuss which one the club would like to pursue first. In the two short weeks between meetings, word came to us of a new New York State law requiring booster seats for all children between the ages of 4 and 7. The problem seemed to be that very few people in the community were even aware of the new law. True to our mission of serving the children in our community, the YCPO committee jumped into action...or should we say "hopped" into action.

YCPO decided to give away 100 booster seats free to the community. The next issue was how to reach those that would need the seats, especially since most people weren't

aware of the law. In addition, 100 booster seats could get very expensive so sources needed to be identified. The solution of venue seemed obvious; in only 4 weeks, the club would hold its annual Easter Egg Hunt at the local elementary school which typically attracted a large number of area children. With many details to iron out and a limited budget, YCPO went to work.

Assistance was obtained from various sources: the New York State Police agreed to provide 24 seats obtained from grant monies and staff the hunt to provide information on car/booster seats and the new law; WalMart agreed to purchase the additional 76 seats and sell them to the club for a discounted price that fit the budget; and a newly-formed chapter of National Safe Kids helped coordinate with all of the involved parties and staff the event with a table full of safety information for parents.

After only a few short weeks and a great deal of legwork, the Easter Egg Hunt and Booster Seat Giveaway was successfully held on Saturday, March 19, 2005 and attracted over 400 children, along with their parents. Over 7,000 eggs were collected to

the delight of the children and all 100 seats were given to parents of children between the ages of 4 and 7. Many parents commented to Kiwanis members about "what a great event this was for the community" and "this is a very special thing that you do."

The event was a true testament to the good that a Kiwanis club can do in its community, even with limited time and money.



Kiwanis Mourns Loss of Kiwanis International Executive Director Emeritus A.G. Terry Shaffer

It is with sadness that we inform you that A.G. Terry Shaffer, Kiwanis International's Executive Director Emeritus, died Saturday, February 19, in Indianapolis, Indiana. Terry's Kiwanis-family affiliation began in high school when he joined the Sunbury High School Key Club and became its treasurer. After attending Susquehanna University in Selinsgrove, Pennsylvania, he taught English and American history at Danville High School in Pennsylvania. In 1959, Terry joined his first Kiwanis club in Selinsgrove, Pennsylvania, and began recording more than 45 years of perfect attendance. He served as President and Secretary of three clubs: Selinsgrove; Southeast Area, Chicago; and Northwest Indianapolis. He also served as secretary of the Kiwanis Club of Tri-Village, Rich Township, Illinois, and two years as the Division 12 Lieutenant Governor in the Pennsylvania District. At the time of his death, he was Lieutenant Governor of the Indy Metro Division in the Indiana District. In 1969, he joined the Kiwanis International Office staff in Chicago and advanced through a variety of positions and responsibilities. He was manager of Club Services, Director of Program Development, Circle K International administrator, Assistant International Secretary for Program Services, and Assistant to the International Secretary. Following seven months as Acting

International Secretary, he was appointed International Secretary effective October 1, 1994. The title was changed to Executive Director in 1998, and he continued in that office until December 31, 2003, when he moved into the position of archivist/historian. Upon his retirement, the Kiwanis International Board named him Executive Director Emeritus. Terry received many of the organization's International-level honors. In addition to Life Member Status, he was a recipient of the Kiwanis International Foundation's Tablet of Honor and was a member of the George F. Hixson Fellowship (diamond-level 13) and Heritage Society. But he also was recognized three times at the club level-as "Kiwanian of the Year"-once each by his clubs in Selinsgrove, Chicago, and Indianapolis. Terry is survived by his wife, Nancy, a former KIWANIS magazine production assistant.

The family has requested that contributions be made to the Kiwanis International Foundation, the Kiwanis Foundation of Indiana, Salvation Army, Cystic Fibrosis, the Humane Society, or the Indianapolis Zoo. Representing Kiwanis International, International President Case Van Kleef and Executive Director Eyjólfur "Eddie" Sigursson attended the service. Terry was flown to his home town in Pennsylvania for burial.





In addition to producing the largest television fund raiser in the world, Children's Miracle Network organizes and executes thousands of special events and promotions each year through its dedicated corporate sponsors and media partners.

Kamp Kiwanis, the crown jewel of the New York District has been greatly improved by the tireless efforts of this devoted Kiwanian.



First, I would like to correct an error on my last column. The amount of money and time that was spent at Kamp Kiwanis over the last 5-6 years for construction is more than one million dollars (\$1,000,000), not on thousand dollars (\$1,000), which was a printed error. We are into our credit line by \$350,000, meaning that we have raised \$650,000 over the last 5-6 years. 
