# Glens Falls Sends Supplies for Iraq Children with Burns

The Kiwanis Club of GLENS FALLS, Mohawk Division - embarked on an international project, beginning in March 2007 collecting over-the-counter medicines, hygienic supplies and other sundries for children in Iraq who suffer burns through-out their daily lives. The pediatric burn clinic is called the Smith Gate Clinic, named after Corporal Darrell Smith of Indiana who was killed in combat. The clinic, set up in an 18-wheeler trailer, is run by our American soldiers who are providing care to our troops but also take the time to treat the Iraqi children. The soldiers treat as many as 30 children day who have suffered burns from a variety of causes, such as spilt milk which is heated over open flame. There is no burn treatment expertise among the Iraqi's and these children often suffer in agony with little to no pain medication.

Glens Falls Kiwanis is proud to announce that it sent over nine boxes of supplies to the Smith Gate Clinic and collected over \$1,000 in funds to be sent to the Smith Gate Foundation for surgical supplies. This success is directly attributable to our wonderful Key Club organizations who collected countless supplies and raised the majority of the funds. The Glens Falls Hi-Y Student Association presented the Key Club at Glens



Falls High School with a check for \$1,000. Thanks also belong to COOL Insuring Agency, Glens Falls National Bank, TD Banknorth and Adirondack Trust for allowing the Kiwanis Club of Glens Falls to place boxes for collection of items in their buildings. 

In a move that coincides with scientific concern worldwide over global warming and the resultant increase in the range and numbers of ticks and tick-borne diseases, Columbia University Medical Center has opened the first endowed research center for chronic Lyme disease in the world on April 30th. The Lyme & Tick-Borne Diseases Research Center in New York will use its vast resources to bring together various disciplines from within and outside of the University to address fundamental clinical and basic science questions that plague adults and children affected by Lyme disease.

The New York District Pediatric Lyme Disease Emergency Relief Fund was started seven years ago when I was governor of this great district. We are now a non-profit foundation dedicated to public education of the prevention and treatment of Pediatric Lyme Disease.

According to all published reports that I have read, this year is expected to be the worst in many years of reported Lyme disease cases. So far this year we are helping or will be helping young children with Lyme disease in: Long Island, Brooklyn, the Bronx, and Hudson Valley and in the Rochester area. As I have said many times in my visits to the clubs and divisions in our district, Lyme disease is not a down state or up state problem, it is a problem throughout the state. IF YOU KNOW ANYONE IN YOUR AREA WITH LYME DISEASE, PLEASE GIVE ME OR ANYONE ON OUR BOARD A CALL. WE WILL HELP!

In my many travels throughout New York State the concerns and questions are almost all alike. But the one most asked is could I put together a list of symptoms and signs. Well I have with the help of many fine doctors and that list is below.

#### LYME DISEASE SYMPTOMS OR SIGNS:

Persistent swollen glands Sore throat Fevers

Joint pain (fingers, toes, ankles, wrists, knees, elbows, hips, shoulders)
Joint swelling
Unexplained back pain
Stiffness of the joints or back
Muscle pain or cramps
Muscle weakness
Confusion (difficult thinking)
Difficulty with concentration
(reading, problem absorbing
new information)

Word search (name blocking)
Forgetfulness (poor short term memory, poor attention)

Disorientation (getting lost, going to wrong places)

Speech errors (wrong word, misspeaking)
Mood swings (depression)

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
