I would like to share with you some exciting news about the Kiwanis Pediatric Trauma Center Foundation, Inc. (KPTC) serving children who are victims of preventable trauma.

At its 2016 Annual Meeting, a name change was approved omitting a specific reference to one particular pediatric trauma hospital in the 14 counties in which the KPTC Foundation is chartered by Kiwanis International to operate.

The foundation had previously been named the Kiwanis Pediatric Trauma Center at North Shore University Hospital Foundation.

The KPTC Board voted to widen its serv-

ice opportunities to where Level One trauma centers operate in Long Island, New York City, Westchester, and the Hudson Valley.

For more than 20 years, thanks to the dedication of so many Kiwanis Family Members and clubs predominantly on Long Island, the KPTC Board was able to grant more than \$1 million to Cohen Children's Medical Center (CCMC) and its predecessor, LIJ-North Shore. A plaque commemorating this remarkable achievement is located in the CCMC lobby.

The change will position the KPTC to support funding proposals from more than one qualified pediatric trauma center on Long Island.

Presently, the KPTC board is looking into supporting the Level One pediatric trauma programs at Stony Brook University Medical Center and will begin introducing its "Distracted Driving Program" to areas outside of Long Island.

Tickets are \$75 per person. The cocktail hour begins at 7:40 p.m., with dinner to follow.

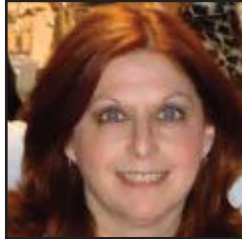
In addition to purchasing tickets, supporters also can put an ad in the program journal for the evening to support the event.
