Kiwanis International Club Newsletter Contest

The Kiwanis International Club Newsletter Contest has changed. First, the term used to designate the club publication, formerly club "bulletin," is now club "newsletter."

The second change is the elimination of the five divisions based on club membership size. Beginning with the 2001-02 year, just one entry, the "best of the district," is eligible for judging in the International contest.

Districts are encouraged to continue their newsletter contests utilizing the traditional size categories. By awarding banner patches or prizes in five categories based upon club membership size or other criteria, more club editors will be encouraged to perform at the highest level in order to receive recognition in their district. But each district now also should create the new category of overall Best Club Newsletter.

The five club size divisions were originally created by Kiwanis International because printing was expensive and club size determined the potential publication budget. Recently, however, the Internet and the personal computer have rapidly developed into the communicative tools of choice for businesses, organizations, and individuals.

Today, any Kiwanian with a personal computer and desktop publishing skills can produce a top-quality club newsletter, regardless of club size. The International Club Newsletter Contest will encourage these efforts by recognizing the best of the best.

PURPOSE: To stimulate the production of effective club newsletters, build morale among club editors, and improve this prime source of Kiwanis communication.

PROCEDURES: Kiwanis clubs will enter their newsletters in their district's club newsletter contest, by such a deadline that judging can be completed in time for awards to be presented at the district convention. Each district will then forward its choice of the best club newsletter in the district for entry in the International Club Newsletter Contest.

DEADLINE: Three or more representative issues of district winners will be submitted to the Kiwanis International public relations department by September 30.

JUDGING: Judging will be performed by the chairman of the International Committee for Marketing and Public Relations and a judging panel chosen by the chairman.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF WINNER: The International Contest winner will be notified in the spring prior to the International Convention.

Delegates approve merging Constitution, Bylaws; annual dues; global magazine

A proposal to merge the Kiwanis International Constitution and Bylaws into one document was approved by the 2004 House of Delegates, which convened Monday and Tuesday at the 89th Annual International Convention in St. Louis, Missouri. In other action, delegates approved a measure that will allow for annual dues billing and a proposal to provide for a global magazine.

The effort to produce one governing document – to be known as the Kiwanis International Bylaws – was undertaken more than two years ago by the International Committee on Constitution and Bylaws. The committee met regularly, reviewing each document line by line to produce one that would be easier for Kiwanians to understand and use. Outdated language and redundancies were removed, but substantive provisions of each document were left unchanged.

The move to annual dues is expected to reduce a club secretary/treasurer's workload and save Kiwanis International money while increasing efficiency. Under the plan approved by delegates, which will not be implemented until the 2005-06 Kiwanis year, clubs will pay International and district dues, based on a club's anniversary date.

Under the amendment to establish Kiwanis magazine as a global publication, each club in the United States and English-speaking Canada will collect from each member US\$8 per year for six issues, with clubs in all other areas collecting \$4 per member for three issues.

Action taken by delegates:

AMENDMENT #1 – To require that any amendment to the Constitution require a two-thirds vote be made by a written or electronic ballot. PASSED

AMENDMENT #2 – To provide for annual dues, effective Oct. 1, 2005. PASSED

AMENDMENT #3 – To provide a worldwide publications. PASSED, AS AMENDED

AMENDMENT #4 – To reduce the number of members on the Standing Committee on Past International Presidents to eight members and provide that the members of the Standing Committee are members of Council. DEFEATED

AMENDMENT #5 –To include lieutenant governors-elect as delegates-at-large to all International conventions. PASSED, AS AMENDED.

AMENDMENT #6 – To allow districts to establish an alternate form of district governance. PASSED.






North Central Staten Island Club Hosts 20th Annual Easter Junior Golf Outing



Minisink Valley Kiwanians Got Heart

The Kiwanis Club of **MINISINK VALLEY**, Hudson River West Division – “YOU'VE GOT TO HAVE HEART...” “That was the headline in the Minisink Valley Central School District Newsletter recently mailed to all district residents. The accompanying article gave “special recognition and thanks” to the members of the Kiwanis Club of Minisink Valley.

At its regular meeting on Feb 10, 2004, the Club hosted special guest, Dr. Martha Murray, Superintendent of the Minisink Valley Central School District. Dr. Murray was present to accept a check from club president Gary Calta to fund the purchase of an Automated External Defibrillator (AED). The check covered the cost of the unit, a wall mount, and pediatric electrode pads. Although the school district currently has five AEDs an additional unit was needed for the pool area and for use at athletic events. The equipment is mandated by New York State and plays an important part in the school's safety program.

The club had recently presented the school district with funds to purchase pediatric electrode pads for the schools existing AEDs and to pay for the associated training.

This year's Governor's Project, Kiwanis and Kids Fit Together, has stimulated many imaginative ideas from of our clubs on how to combat childhood obesity. I would like to share a few of these clubs projects with you. I would also like to thank those of you who have already completed their projects and encourage those who have not yet started their projects to do so.

The Copiague Club in the Suffolk West Division created a spotlight project on physical fitness. They went to their local elementary school and provided instructions on proper nutrition; the proper way to get your body warmed up before taking on a physical activity, like soccer; and the need to loosen your muscles by stretching and doing short running sprints in order to prepare your body for a physical activity. They also handed out booklets and pamphlets on the reasons why fitness is important.

Several clubs, like Sunnyside, Clarence and Wynantskill, purchased uniforms for their local teams and then went to their games to support them. The Levittown and Wantagh Kiwanis both held Health Fairs in their local communities to promote safety awareness, drug awareness and nutritional awareness.

The East Meadow Club, under DPP Jim Richards, extended the scope of the project. He set up a website group under the President's Council for Physical Fitness and Sports President's Challenge program, in which anyone who participated in the challenge could keep track of their progress and accomplishments during the several weeks that the challenge took to complete. Many of our members, including Gov. Peter, did so.



Public Relations

As you know, the purpose of Kiwanis public relations is to create greater awareness, understanding, and appreciation of Kiwanis. This refers not only to relations with the public but among Kiwanians. External publicity and internal newsletters have been discussed; here are some other resources that might be used to promote Kiwanis.

1. **Participation in holiday parades** in the community; this may or may not require a fee. In some instances the club could sponsor an award to be presented at the end of the parade - such as originality of marching group or float.

2. **Placement of road signs** at the borders of the community indicating that a Kiwanis club meets in that community; also a sub-sign could indicate where and when the club meets.

3. **Billboard signs and posters** where applicable.

4. Tell your story in a **club brochure**. Every club should have a simple, concise, colorful (if possible) brochure which could include:

- Both Kiwanis Int'l and club logos
- Brief explanation of Kiwanis International and "Serving the children of the world."
- Name of club, meeting time and place, brief history. Point out that even though Kiwanis is an international organization, the focus of the local club is to meet the needs of children in your community as its first priority.
- A listing of the club projects
- Tell how Kiwanis would benefit the community
- Club roster (optional) could be included
- How Kiwanis benefits its members
- Expectations of membership
- Publicize the results of the club's hard work; not the hard work itself
- Always provide a contact with phone number, e-mail address, and mailing address.

5. **Make your meetings memorable.** Create a master list of speakers to invite to do programs at the meetings. Make sure the meal is worth the cost. Begin on time. Introduce your guests and make them feel welcome.

6. **Take advantage of member benefits.** Many companies ranging from Pepsi to Unidial have partnered with Kiwanis to provide fund-raising opportunities for clubs and savings on products for members. Check them out on the Website at Kiwanis.org.

7. **Subscribe to The Inciter Marketing Newsletter** (available online at Kiwanis.org)

8. **Be involved with the sponsored youth** in your community: K-Kids, Builders Clubs, Key Clubs, Circle K, and Aktion Clubs. There are tremendous marketing opportunities. The seeds can be sown for future Kiwanis membership. Invite members and their parents to meetings on a rotating sys-

OUR YOUTH IN THE MILITARY

The 9/11 2001 terrorist attack on the New York City Trade Center and the Pentagon, and the on-going violence in Iraq, has indeed, revealed how much the youth of Modern America care for their country – just as did their Fathers, Grandfathers, and Great-grandfathers years ago.

Recently, I received through the Internet, vivid photos of our troops serving in Iraq with a heart-moving story depicting the average young man in the military today. I was so deeply moved by the article that I decided to share it with you. It's a timely subject, inspirational, with a clear message: "Regardless of the many opinions concerning the war in Iraq, we are truly fortunate to have devoted men and women in the Armed Forces to defend our freedoms and way of life. They deserved our everlasting support and gratitude. And now the story-author unknown.

The average age of a young man in the military today is 19 years of age. He's a recent High School graduate, he was probably an average student, pursued some sort of sport activities, and had a steady girlfriend that either broke up with him when he left, or swears to be waiting when he returns from half a world away. He listens to rock and roll or hip-hop or swings a 155mm howitzer. He is 10 or 15 pound lighter now than when he was at home because he is working or fighting from before dawn to well after dark.

He has trouble spelling, thus letter writing is a pain for him, but he can field strip a rifle in 30 seconds and reassemble it in the dark. He can recite to you the nomenclature of a machine gun or grenade launcher and use either one effectively if he must. He digs foxholes and can apply first aid like a professional.

He obeys orders instantly and without hesitation, but he is not without spirit or individual dignity. He is self-sufficient. He has two sets of fatigues: he washes one and wears the other. He keeps his canteens full and his feet dry. He sometimes forgets to brush his teeth, but never to clean his rifle. He can cook his own meals, mend his clothes, and fix his own hurts. If you're thirsty, he'll share his water with you; if you are hungry, his food. He'll even split his ammunition with you in the midst of battle when you run low.

He has learned to use his hands like weapons and weapons like they were his hands. He can save your life – or take it, because that is his job. He will often do twice the work of a civilian, draw half the pay and still find ironic humor in it all. He has seen more suffering and death than he should have in his short lifetime.

He has stood atop of mountains of dead bodies, and helped to create them. He has wept in public and in private, for friends who have fallen in combat and is unashamed. He feels every note of the National Anthem vibrate







Chester Member Collects 10,568 Cards for Kids



advisors and many general members participating. Rarely do you see such a broad spectrum of the K-Family at work together, side by side. It was quite inspirational."


From planning to completion, the K-Family members collectively contributed approximately 250 service hours in this effort.

AMENDMENT #8 – To require the use of a written ballot to change dues and some fees paying to Kiwanis International by individual Kiwanis clubs and members. **DECLARED MOOT.**

AMENDMENT #9 – To provide Kiwanis clubs with oversight, through the House of Delegates, of dues and/or membership fees for sponsored youth programs that don't elect their own Board of Trustees. **DEFEATED.**

AMENDMENT #10 – To reduce the annual per capita International dues from US\$42 to US\$35. **DEFEATED.**

AMENDMENT # 11 – To use bar-code scanning to validate admission into the House of Delegates. **DEFEATED.**



District Historian

80 Years of District Bulletins

This year's August 18-22 District convention in Buffalo marks the 80th anniversary of our first convention in that city. At that 1924 convention the delegates approved the mailing of our district bulletin to each and every Kiwanian in the district. (Prior to 1924 a bulletin had been printed or multigraphed by District Secretaries Sam Stubbs of Rochester and Fred Loomis of Elmira and mailed only to club officers.)

Implementing the 1924 resolution, "The Kiwanis Courier," initially edited and published by District Secretary Robert C. Hyde in Binghamton, served us well until 1931.

On January 12, 1931 a committee of three lieutenant governors appointed by Governor Franklin C. Huntington of Oneonta recommended that the District enter into a one-year contract with Kiwanian/Printer George H. Prout of Troy to edit and publish a newly-formatted, approximately 6" x 9" district magazine named "The Empire State Kiwanian". The first issue was mailed on January 30, 1931 at which time there were some 5,000 members in 69 clubs in 7 divisions on the mailing list.

Incredibly and happily, the one year arrangement with George Prout continued for 42 years, until 1973, and for an additional nine years, until 1982, with his son Kiwanian W. Harry Prout also of Troy, over 50 years with the truly dedicated and esteemed Prout family. For this extraordinary contribution to our district, the much-loved George Prout was named an Honorary Past Governor in 1963. (His grandson James E. Prout Esq. Past President of the Troy club and past Lieutenant Governor of the Van Rensselaer division serves at this year's district chair for community services; and one of Jim's two lovely daughters, Olivia, is already a Key Clubber.)

The five decades of the Prout/ESK era ended in late 1982 with the appointment as editor of Kiwanian Richard Trupkin of Woodside, DPLG of our Queens West Division, who introduced the tabloid format so familiar to today's New York Kiwanians. With the exception of one administrative year, 1993 - 94, when our editor was David Gallagher of Hamburg, Richie Trupkin edited an award-winning ESK with flair and distinction until his untimely and tragic death in December 1996. Answering the call to complete the 1996 - 97 administrative year was Kiwanian Maureen Neuringer, our current editor.

For the following three years, from October 1, 1997 until September 30, 2000, David Gallagher of Hamburg returned to serve as editor with dedication and professionalism, upholding the excellent traditions and reputation of our district bulletin.

Since October 2000, we have benefited hugely from the expert and highly motivated services of a truly dedicated Kiwanian Maureen Neuringer, as our ESK editor.






