NY Governor Mancuso Advises Ontario Division Develop Programs to Reduce Childhood Obesity

Ontario Division – Stressing the need to reduce excess weight and obesity among children, New York District Governor Peter J. Mancuso outlined his 2003-04 Governor's Project as "Kiwanis and Kids Fit Together" in his visit to Syracuse on February 26.

In making official Ontario Division visit at the Empire Room, NY State Fairgrounds, Governor Mancuso emphasized the need for Kiwanis, Key Clubs, and Circle K to promote physical fitness programs and sports among growing children. His goal is to bring awareness and offer encouragement to Kiwanians to tackle this growing problem of overweight children, and resulting illnesses.



He strongly emphasized the need for Kiwanis clubs to include Sponsored Youth in its activities, because--as he put it,"These kids are enthusiastic, and are very able."

In his comments, especially to new officers, he advised:

- Start your club assessment and community survey right away. Don't depend on doing "the same old thing."
- Appoint a Membership Chair, and include a Membership category in your budgeting.
- Edit and return your Club Roster to Kiwanis International right away because your club will be billed according to your membership roster.
- Educate members and officers better to help build growth and attract new members. The goal is to build at least one new club in each division, and make every effort to attract new members from or develop new clubs in diverse areas. Adopt a Growth Agenda, he encouraged.

He thanked Kiwanians for supporting the Worldwide Service Project to eliminate iodine deficiency disorders throughout the world - a project already at work in more than 90 countries.

Lt. Governor for Ontario Division Sam Wolcott received the Division Home Club Banner from Immediate Past Lt. Governor Marlene Gosson. Both are members of Solvay Geddes Camillus Kiwanis Club.

In his remarks, Lt. Governor Wolcott cited the need for rehabilitation of clubs to fit present day needs in their communities. . .strong clubs need to help smaller clubs ... encourage younger members to join the Kiwanis ranks, especially those under 39 years of age.

Governor Mancuso helped with the group induction of new club presidents and secretaries, encouraging them to take roles of leadership, doing a better job of promoting the club and its projects...and to remember that "In Serving Others, We Grow."

He cited special projects now being accomplished by clubs in the division. Past Lt. Governor Arnold Bitterman of DeWitt Club told of the success of the division's Annual Pancake Breakfast to benefit Children's Miracle Network. Secretary Mary DiPietro of E. Syracuse/Eastwood Club explained the success of the Book Collection and Distribution to schools for their reading encouragement programs.

Congratulations to IPLG Dave Goodwin of the Genesee Division, who led the team that built our first new club of the year - the Kiwanis Club of LeRoy Pavilion Stafford! Actually, they began this work last year, so IPG Justin and First Lady (LGE) Joanne Underwood, who both contributed mightily to the effort, have much of which to be proud.

The LeRoy club was built the old fashioned way. With the assistance of Harry White of the Kiwanis International staff and District New Club Building Chair Mike Malark, Dave, Justin, Joanne and other Genesee Kiwanians pounded the pavements of these communities recruiting potential members, until there were enough of them to start a club. The LeRoy club is now busily planning its first service projects and contributing to the betterment of its communities. And it is being actively supported by members of the Genesee division, who attend each of the new club's meetings.

The same thing that has taken place in LeRoy Pavilion Stafford is now underway in a number of different divisions in our district, and hopefully by the time that you read this, there will be more good news to share. This process can be repeated in any community in our district that is not currently benefitting from the presence of a Kiwanis club. And the same approach could also be used to rebuild or revitalize any of our existing clubs.

With this in mind, each of our Lieutenant Governors has been asked to form a Divisional Membership Team, perhaps 8 to 10 members from across the division, who would solicit prospective members on a door to door basis in a community to build a new club. They could also recruit potential members in exactly the same way to rebuild an existing club, where the membership in that club has declined to such an extent that a traditional membership campaign is unlikely to be successful. In this situation, the intent is literally to build a new club next to the old one, and then knock down the wall that separates them.

I would like to ask you to consider volunteering for this assignment. All team members will be trained by a Kiwanis International or New York District representative prior to any recruiting and will thereafter work in pairs. As a team member, you will be provided with information and pointers on how to state the case for Kiwanis clearly and concisely. You will also be assisted by other Kiwanians from around the district, as may be needed to get the job done. As in any "sales" position, you will get your fair share of rejection, but the ultimate satisfaction of succeeding in building or revitalizing a club will far outweigh it.

I anticipate that your Lieutenant Governor will be contacting you shortly to ask whether

The "President's Challenge" is a series of various programs encouraging physical fitness by defining goals for different age categories. The "President's Challenge" programs are designed to encourage an active lifestyle and promote good health, a perfect application for the Governor's Project.

While emphasizing the important relationship between exercise and good health, the President's Council on Physical Fitness will recognize the participants with an award upon their completion of the goals set by the program. This recognition award may offer assistance in many areas such as Scouts working towards badges and students making applications for college.

Another benefit of this program is having individuals participating in activities together to meet their individual goals. This "teamwork" effort will not only encourage physical activity but would also promote quality time with family and friends. And let's face it, getting away from the television and computer and spending time with others could offer many social rewards.

On another subject, by now your club should have had personal contact with every member who has not paid their 2003-04 dues, to determine whether they will do so. Those who have not paid should be made the subject of a motion at your next Board meeting to terminate their membership, effective March 31, 2004, if their dues have not been paid by that date. They should also be sent a letter from the club immediately after that Board meeting informing them of this decision. If they have not paid their dues by then, they should be dropped on the March monthly report, so that your club will not have to pay the second half of their dues.

From that point on there should be no further drops during this administrative year. Everyone who has not paid his or her dues will have already been dropped. You will know exactly how many members you need during the rest of the year in order to finish on September 30 with a sufficient net growth in members so as to achieve Distinguished status. The last half of this year should then be devoted to the membership drives and other events needed to make this happen. In that regard, our District Membership Team is ready offer any suggestions or advice that may be of assistance to you.

That team, by the way, is led by Membership Chair Ray Pfeifer and Membership Coordinator Ann Sewert, who have done a tremendous and well received job of traveling all over our district this year presenting programs on membership. "Children living with an ill sibling are often burdened by feelings of anger, fear, jealousy, guilt, abandonment and loss. *SIBS Place* restores many of the family routines typically forgotten when a family copes with illness."





They often serve as chaperon at the Key Club conventions.

The Kiwanis Lt. Governors should take the initiative and make sure that his or her counterpart, the Key Club or Circle K new Lt. Governors are elected prior to the District conventions. They should oversee the election together with the District sponsored Youth Committee.

Lindenhurst Gets the Word Out About a Whale of a Program

The Kiwanis Club of LINDENHURST. Suffolk West Division - instituted the WHALE program, "We Have A Little Emergency." The program is an identification and information package for child car safety seats. In the event of a motor Vehicle accident that incapacitates the driver, emergency service personnel have no source of information to identify the child or his/her social needs. The WHALE Program helps with that information.

The WHALE program requires the use of one information label, attached to the back of the car seat. In addition, two WHALE car seat stickers are attach to each side of the car seat.

The labels alert rescue personnel that behind the seat there is information about the child. Last but not least, two WHALE stickers attach to the rear side windows, of the vehicle alert rescuers that the occupant participate in the program.

The WHALE program is the first of it's kind in the United States and is currently used in at least 32 states.

review the group's collective progress. When registration is completed, you will receive a Group ID Number.

How does an individual join the group?

Before you get started, you must get the Group Name and Group ID Number from the appointed Group Administrator.

- 1. Go to the website www.presidentschallenge.org
- 2. Go to log-in at the top right screen.
- 3. At the bottom of the log-in screen, go to individual registration.

The registration screen will appear. Be certain to enter the Group Name and the Group ID Number you received from your club's Group Administrator.

The "President's Challenge" has a series of programs. In which one do I enlist?

The easiest and suggested program to begin with is the *Active Lifestyle Program*. The participant must be engaged in some activity, whether it is walking, taking an exercise class, playing a sport, doing chores, or other similar activity. The activity selected by the participant must be done for 30 minutes (adults) or 60 minutes (17 years and younger) per day, 5 days a week for 6 weeks.

How are the time and activity logged?

When the individual participant registers, they will give a user name (their name) and a password. Each time they perform a qualified activity, they can go to the website and log-in to their personal profile and enter the activity performed.

Must a participant log-in and enter their activity every day?

No, a participant can go back 7 days to enter their activities for the past 7 days.

How are the awards presented?

As the sponsor of the group, your club will be able to purchase the awards and present them to all in your group who successfully achieved their goal. The awards are not expensive. For more information, the awards are listed at the website.

Don't shy away from this project thinking it's difficult. After reviewing the website and registering, you will be surprised how easy it is to participate both as a group and individually. More importantly, you will be joining Governor Peter in his campaign to improve our health and the health of our children by encouraging an active lifestyle.


Why all the excitement? It's the North Shore Kiwanis Club of Long Island annual Mini Mart, a combination and crafts fair organized in 1969.



Our District and Kiwanis International

As poor Martha Stewart might say, "It's a good thing" to focus, occasionally, even if only briefly, on the many ways in which our district has contributed throughout its history to the administration of Kiwanis International. To begin with since all District Governor's are officers of International, we have provided 85 officers to Kiwanis International since our District was formed in 1918.

Then, of those 85 dedicated leaders, ten went on the serve our parent organization as KI board members: five as trustees;

Frank Haven of Brooklyn, 1938-41; Carl Koestower of Batavia, 1940-46; Si Reynolds of Rochester, 1953-57; Don Mumford of New York City, 1958-62; and General Jack McMahon, also of NYC 1966-70

Three attained the Vice Presidency; **La Rue Smith** of Niagara Falls, 1951-52; **Steve Hart** of Irvington 1976-77

and again in 1978-79; and **Jack Harten** of Webster 2002-2003.

Jack Harten of Webster 2002-2003. Two achieved Kiwanis' highest office President of Kiwanis International:

Anton J."Tony" Kaiser of Farmingdale, 1987-88, yours truly, and

Jerry Christiano of Leicester, 1996-97. Of the 85 Governors, 54 have passed on and 31 are still with us, including the last four of the mentioned former KI Board Members.

Notably as well, our district has already provided three presidents of the Kiwanis International Foundation:

Larry Hapgood of Malone,1991-1992, 1952 Governor and long-time dean of Past Governors and subsequently a 26 year KI senior staff member and historian;

Lou Theiss of Bayside, 1992-93, 1969-70 Governor and perennial District Treasurer;

Bill Martin of Oneonta, 2001-2002, 1981-82 Governor and former and current Secretary-Treasurer.

Not to be forgotten, another source of district pride, is the sources of other distinguished New York Kiwanians who have served or are serving KI and KIF so well, as important committee chairs and committee members.

Like Kiwanis, Key Club and Circle K International have been also served well by the New York District. We provide both leadership and participation in numerous programs. One New Yorker, Doug Madenburg from Walt Whitman High School in Huntington, Long Island served as Key Club International President in 1987-88.

Four Presidents of Circle K International hailed from the Empire State thus far: George Latimer, Fordham University 1973-74; Craig Miller, College of Insurance 1974-75; Greg Faulkner, Baruch College 1975-76; and Jason Seiner, New York University 1990-91. *Continued on Page 10*

Does your club have internal publicity? Do you have a newsletter or any kind of communication for your members? If you don't have this type of communication for your club, you should. Keeping members informed contributes to more member involvement and satisfaction.

An organization such as Kiwanis, which serves the community, is much more effective in its service when the members are aware of what is happening at club meetings, throughout the division and the district. Our meetings should be fun and informative and not just an endless list of activities and announcements; the newsletter is the internal arm and connection that helps to keep the meetings from becoming stale.

With a club newsletter, each member receives the same information and has a printed record/reminder, calendar of events, and the report of club board actions and plans. These newsletters are archived (or should be) as part of the club's records. What fun to look back to older issues when celebrating significant anniversaries for the club.

How often should we publish? Ideally every time there is a meeting but that does, get expensive. Once a month is better than not at all. Some clubs do bi-weekly newsletters and send postcards in the interim. Whatever fits your time and budget as long as your membership is kept informed. Newsletters distributed at a meeting usually are left behind and not read. They should be mailed either by "snail mail" or email. Sending by email can save the club a lot of money. The newsletter could be in Microsoft Word or converted to a .pdf file in Adobe Acrobat, such as the district uses to send information to clubs.

Some clubs have jackets on their newsletters with paid ads which pay for the postage and paper and printing (or at least partially) for each issue. This, of course, is time consuming and requires someone to solicit the ads and place them in the issue.


Many modes of presentation can be used. Some clubs have glossy, typeset newsletters and others use a memo-style of communication. Most are produced from typed copy and black and white "line" (not shaded) artwork is used. It's nice to have someone who can work with graphics, but that is not necessary. Photos of activities and members can be included; some are printing their newsletters on color printers even though it takes a while to print 20 or 30 newsletters.

What should be in the newsletter?

- 1. Announcements of club meetings and activities
- 2. Synopsis report of the previous meeting(s)
- 3. Committee reports, recognition of individual and club contributions and accomplishments

Keeping Kiwanians Educated at Mid Year Conference Forums



The luncheon was ended with a "celebration of light." The ceremony included each club in the division lighting a candle as LG Sr.





General Liability- What is it and why do I care?

Every Kiwanian, Sponsored Youth, volunteer, spouse and anyone working at a Kiwanis project or function as well as your Club, District and Kiwanis International is fully covered for liability exposures by the Kiwanis Liability insurance policy. We pay for this important coverage as part of our annual dues. In our litigious society we need this protection.

A very important coverage that is part of this policy is non-owned Auto Liability. Suppose you are taking five Sponsored Youths to the Fall Rally and there is a serious accident. Whose insurance covers your car and the injuries to the children and the other car? In most states, the insurance on your car is primary, which means that it protects you and Kiwanis. Your policy only provides \$100,000 of coverage and the costs are much great than \$100,000. Kiwanis International's non-owned Auto Insurance takes over and the full liability limit is available to protect you and Kiwanis.

Most club projects and functions are covered by this policy, however there are a few exceptions, and these are important. If alcohol, is sold the policy does not provide coverage. This means if any money changes hands, in anyway, for the consumption of alcohol there is no coverage. You need to buy a special Events policy to cover this Liquor Liability exposure. Other areas where there is limited or no coverage include the use or aircraft, bungee jumping and other hazardous events. If you are not sure if your event is covered by this policy call the Hylant group at (800) 678-0361, or call New York District Risk Manager DPLG Steve Bernstein 516-938-0600 or 516-931-6344. Don't assume you have coverage, ask!

New Member Orientation

Are you interested why you are losing members, read this . . .

Why I left a Kiwanis Club

First, you need to know how excited I was when I was first asked to attend a luncheon meeting of Kiwanis on Tuesday at noon. I was asked because the Mayor of our city was going to speak and my friend who asked me knew how interested I was in our city's growth and development.

After several meetings and getting to know the men and women who wear the "K", I was pleased to be asked to become a member, for I found that our goals of a better community and your commitment to our children were in line with mine.

But you ask, who am I? I am one of more 50,000 individuals who left Kiwanis in North America over the past 2 years. I am one of 3,100 individuals who received a survey developed by the 1996-97 International Committee on Club operations and member retention.

Finally, I am one of 622 past members who took the time to complete the survey and return it to Kiwanis International. For the first time, Kiwanis International knows why I left.I represent members from our smallest clubs to the very largest clubs. I speak for both men and women, for 149 (24%) women who took the time to complete the survey.

I speak for people of color and members of all ages. I speak for clubs that meet in the morning, noon and night. While we differ in every way it is possible for 622 people to differ, there is great commonality and consensus among our reasons for leaving Kiwanis.

You know that I was as excited about being asked to join Kiwanis as you were. You know that I also speak for the men and women who have left our club. Now, you will know why.

I have been leaving Kiwanis at the rate of 68 members every day of the year for the last 2 years and there is only one hope in our future to change this staggering fact. I will unveil that hope at the end of the article.

But now let me cover the 7 major reasons why I left. As you read the list, please take the time to picture in your mind the members of your club who have left for each of the following reasons in the last two years.

- I died and I will continue to die at higher percentages because our organization is getting older and death is a natural part of growing older. No, I don't speak for the dead, but we need to be aware that we must add members that match your age when you joined Kiwanis.
- 2) I am not a happy with the way your club is run. 475 (76.3%) of us left because we were unhappy with the focus of the club. Your meetings did not start and end on

- 4. General interest items about members (birthdays, anniversaries, trips, etc.)
- 5. Division and district upcoming events
- 6. Kiwanis education
- 7. Report of board actions
- 8. Biographical sketches of new members
- Notice of official meetings such as elections when members will be asked to vote
- 10. Community events of interest to the members
- 11. Fun items cartoon, quotes, jokes, etc.
- 12. Inspirational messages and motivational quotations (see Spiritual Aims SA #1 and "Quote for Club Newsletters")
- 13. Contact information (name, phone number) for club president, secretary and newsletter editor.


There is a Club Newsletter Editor's Kit available from Kl. It includes suggested quotes, education spots, and even some tem-

plates for mastheads.

The "best" format for your newsletter is whatever works best for your club, 8 1/2 by 11 or 8 1/2 by 14. Also plan the format and size with the folding, stuffing and mailing in mind. Keep the content pertinent; members don't want to spend time reading more material than they need to.

A prospective editor doesn't have to be a literary genius, just give the information as succinctly as possible. Have a clean, neat appearance so your message goes through clearly.

Who else should receive a copy other than your members? Other clubs in your division, the Lt. Governor, and possibly other clubs in your community. Send a copy to Governor Peter and/or to me. Consider also entering the district newsletter contest.





In a previous ESK, I discussed in great detail Member Satisfaction. A natural follow up is renewing your commitment. The Club's board of directors needs to define commitment. The difference between expectations and performance should be addressed. As a group, identify the 10 assets that club members need to bring to the club to make it effective. Then identify the 10 benefits the club is expected to provide to its members.

All Kiwanis clubs should undergo regular checkups, because no matter how good your clubs is, you can always do better. Annual assessment will help you identify the current status of your club based on member input. The membership committee should administer the assessment. If that is not possible, it should be someone other than the club president.

Present all the assessment findings to the board of directors and the membership committee. Review the club's strengths and weaknesses as well as suggestions the members provide. These should help you discuss possible strategies for enhancing the clubs' quality. My advice to you is to use the Club Improvement Plan (Club Operations and Administration, Membership Development and Recruitment, Service and Fund-Raisers, Sponsored programs and public awareness) to prioritize strategies and create a timeline for implementation. You should address all concerns, action should be taken, and a deadline for completion should be set. Please keep in mind that harm can be done if member input is solicited and nothing is done with the information. Act swiftly and keep the members informed of the progress.

- 2. A Kiwanian MUST be present at the bus stop when the children depart for Kamp and upon their return. The latter is more important. We are charging agencies that sponsor children a \$50 penalty fee if no representative is present upon the child's return. We do not want to have to do the same with Kiwanis Clubs. Although surprising, several times throughout the summer, parents or guardians neglect to show up at the bus stop to pick up their children. We cannot afford additional delays to our scheduled stops.
- 3. Despite your not knowing if your kampers will have special needs, we can only accept 20 of these children per session. It is crucial that you contact the Kamp as soon as possible. Reserve special needs spaces if you have the slightest thought that your kampers will fit within this category. Remember, ADHD is a special need. We will do our best to accommodate your requests, but in the end, we must adhere to strict ratio guidelines of staff to kamper (1:2).
- 4. The Kamp application includes a new medical form. It is required that this form be signed by a licensed physician. Children cannot attend Kamp Kiwanis without this form. It is unacceptable to attach a school health record or any other medical form other than the Kamp Kiwanis form. Work with the family to acquire this form early on. We hate to turn a child away due to the lack of a medical form.
- 5. If your Club wants to sponsor children and you are having trouble finding candidates, please call the Kamp. We are here to help you!

Please be sure to call me if you would like to arrange to have me make a presentation on Kamp Kiwanis at your Club Meeting. I am happy to travel your way to spread the word of how much your generosity means to those you serve!



Letter from Steven

These are excepts from a letter received by Kamp Kiwanis . . .

Hello everyone my name is Steven. I'm from Queens, NY. I was a recent camper at the greatest camp in the world - Kamp Kiwanis.

2003 marked the completion of Kamp Kiwanis' 35th season in the camping industry. It seems fitting that this summer we also welcomed the American Camping Association to reaccredit our program. The ACA sent two trained visitors to the camp to observe all functions of the camp from human resource policies and facility upkeep to risk management protocol. After 8 hours of scrupulously going through our policies, we were again awarded a rating of excellence! The process always seems to awaken Directors to new ideas and ways of preventing a crisis. I hope these ideas will further allow us to create a safe and sound environment for the children we serve and the staff that supervise them. I recently was also bestowed the honor to be nominated to the 2004 Board of Directors of the Upstate NY ACA Chapter. This will allow Kamp Kiwanis to have a say in how camps are run in NY State as well as be on the cutting edge of new legislation affecting our industry.
